

Chaplains' Corner – An unusual Christmas story

It's a remarkable Christmas story. For all sorts of reasons really. The First World War left ten million dead and twenty million injured. Horrific stuff. But something unexpected occurred on the Western Front. On Christmas Eve 1914, German troops put small Christmas trees above their trenches. The soldiers of both sides, German and English, were in some places barely more than a hundred metres or so from each other.

Then, as the reports go, it happened. A soldier began to sing "Silent Night, holy night." Others joined in. And the carol was taken up by both sides. This led to a shouted agreement across the lines that no shots would be fired. So the soldiers of both armies mingled in what had been no man's land. They exchanged presents – cigarettes, cigars, drinks, other food supplies. An English soldier, a barber, gave his enemies haircuts. Football games were played on Christmas Day. The word went up and down the lines via telegraph. It is thought these Christmas celebrations extended for at least forty kilometres, perhaps many more. There is a profound point to this little piece of history....

- **Christmas carries its own special power** – In the midst of a terrible war, the desire for peace and goodwill was alive and well. And it still is. This desire cannot be easily quenched even when life is unkind and difficult.
- **Deep inside all of us is a longing for peace** – Life is untidy. We are never without pressures and problems. Stress hunts for us. Yet deep inside we want to do better. We don't want to be always out of sorts or hard to get along with. Inner peace is our need.
- **The traditional Christmas story gives us a good clue** – The shepherds minding their sheep were the low-life of their day. The losers. At the bottom of the pile. But they alone heard the angels' song which in part was "Peace on earth."
- **What about peace now?** The pathway to peace within ourselves and with others hinges on goodwill. The offering of kindness, forgiveness, understanding, encouragement and care are gifts beyond price. The givers and receivers of these gifts are both blessed.
- **Christmas day carries its own surprises** – Our soldier/barber of Christmas 1914 had not the faintest idea that before the day was done he would be cutting the hair of the enemy. Such a possibility was surely unthinkable. Yes, we need to expect surprises too.
- **Christmas brings the hope of reconciliation** – Why rule out a good Christmas Day simply because someone from the awkward squad might be there? Turn the other cheek. Rewrite the script. Surprise the difficult one with friendship and warmth. Why not?
- **Even in the dark times we share common hopes and dreams** – Why else would armies at war exchange gifts, play football, sing carols and cut hair? It may be a new thought but we have much in common with people who are very different from us.
- **What about this Christmas then?** It is to be enjoyed. The Christmas story is filled with the hope and joy of a baby born, not in a palace but a stable, of ordinary parents whose new arrival became the model of love, care, compassion and renewal for all times since.

It is my hope and prayer that, as this year comes to an end with a New Year just around the corner, these will be very special times for you and your loved ones. God bless you!
