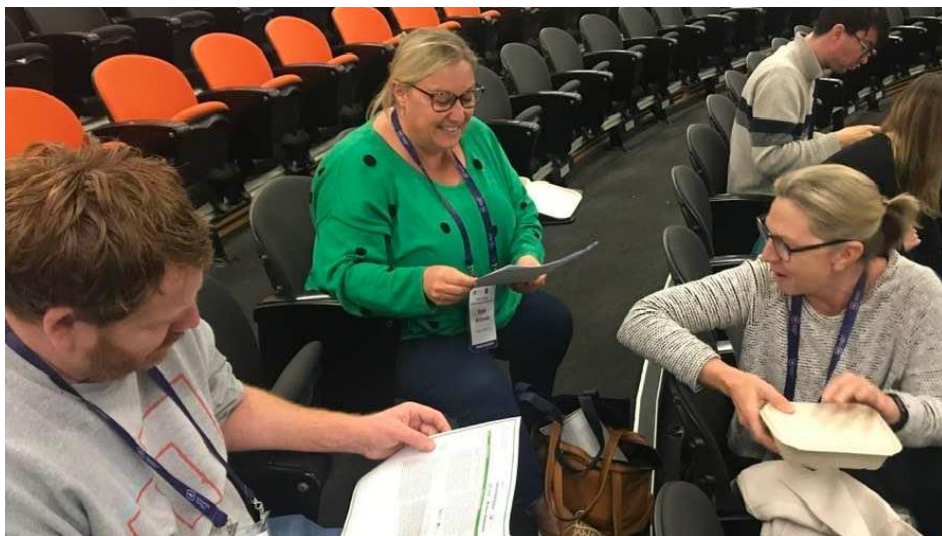
- Parents are able to take children home after lunch.

Chaplains' Corner – Had any misunderstandings lately?

It was an absolute classic. A genuinely good conversation. And it happened where blokes rarely go! In a wonderful Spotlight store, of all places. Judith was needing some material to border a quilt she was making. So I was recruited to help in the selection. I think I know when colours work and when they don't. So, a choice was made and taken to the counter. A young, friendly, very helpful staff member was on the job. And this is when an ordinary conversation became a classic.

Both players in this conversation did their very best. A calculation had to be made to work out what length of material was required to make a 12 centimetre border for the quilt. So the quilt was carefully measured. What then? After many exchanges all in a good spirit, the material was measured, cut and paid for. The result? Judith ended up with far more material than she needed. The problem? Judith was needing only a border for her quilt. But our staff girl kept thinking that Judith wanted a backing for the whole quilt. Now, it struck me that there's a lesson or two just sitting here....

- **This conversation ticked a lot of good boxes** – There was no rush. There were many suggestions, questions and responses. The need to buy the right amount of material was clearly understood. The practical step of measuring the quilt was done carefully.
- **Despite all this, the end result wasn't right** – A misunderstanding of terms – border versus backing – meant that all the effort to get the right result missed the mark. The intentions were good but the final calculation went astray. Thankfully surplus material can be put to good use in a later project.
- **So, here's a good lesson waiting to be learnt** – Misunderstandings occur even when we listen carefully and do our best to explain what we are on about. It can happen to any of us, in any situation. With all that happens in families, misunderstandings happen easily.
- **What do we need to be on the lookout for?** – Well, mums and dads need to make allowances for their little people. Young ones don't have a vast array of words to help them explain where they're at. Even parents can struggle with this. Ever had trouble putting feelings into words? It's not easy.
- **Misunderstandings arrive when we're in a hurry** – If it's a big deal issue that's on our plate, quit the rush to resolve it. Listening is a gift that requires time to do its best work. So, make a time to listen well. "Hey, that's important, so let's talk about this after tea."
- **Be sure you know what that family issue really is** – This means that you've listened attentively, that you've asked questions to be sure that you know what the current concern is for your partner or child. Clarity is the key to moving forward. Identify the issue and the way forward is set.
- **Clear up any misunderstandings before making decisions** – With all the pressure on busy families, we run the risk of wanting to solve our stuff quickly. Often too quickly. But, haste will produce serious drama if you push for decisions and solutions without having tagged the actual problem.
- **What's next when it's clear there's been a misunderstanding?** – Even with attentive listening, the investment of time, the effort to identify the problem, there's still a chance of misunderstandings arriving. Once this becomes evident, start over. Offer an apology if that's needed.

A family which accepts that misunderstandings can happen any time will be well set up to make corrections and deal with them. Just put the spotlight on them, listen carefully and respond creatively.

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
